



Girl Scout Law - I will do my best

To be Honest and Fair

- Allow for others to be first, your girls should be self-disciplined.
- Use CONSTRUCTIVE criticism AT the APPROPRIATE TIME (i.e. event evaluations)
- Rules that apply to all ALSO apply to you
- Use Safety-wise ratios as minimum number of adult chaperones and MAXIMUM. More adults mean fewer girls can attend the event.

Friendly and Helpful

- Offer help whenever possible - not just when asked.
- If you are unhappy with an event, offer to lead the event next year and try to make it better.

Considerate and Caring

- All troops must abide by the guidelines for lights out and quiet times.
- Remember, you get frustrated with your girls at times, when leading an event, the coordinator may seem cool and composed, but underneath, her frustration is 10 times yours!
- Be ON TIME with your registrations. We don't want to cancel an event due to late registrations.

Courageous and Strong

- Make the best of every situation

Responsible for What I Say and Do

- ALWAYS set a POSITIVE example, and accept responsibility for yourself and your troop.
- If you say "I'll do it!" Be responsible and do it, this includes being prepared.

And to Respect Myself and Others

- You are making first impressions with leaders and lasting impressions with the girls.

Respect Authority

- Event facilitators ARE the leaders for the event, YOU are the leader of your troop, and responsible for their behavior.

Use Resources Wisely

- Always clean up.

Make the World a Better Place

- Sometimes you just have to laugh about a problem and go on (Don't sweat the small stuff")
- Leave nature natural

And a Sister to EVERY Girl Scout

- Although you are most concerned for your girls, there are other troops, leaders, volunteers, volunteer event staff and Girl Scouts to consider.
- Keep in mind an older Girl Scout might be leading the event you are attending. Be constructive on your evaluation. We don't expect adults to be perfect and we shouldn't expect older girls to be either.
